Animal Nutrition* (ASC 378)	3 cr
Animal Science* (includes poultry science) ASC 106	6 cr
Biochemistry (BCH 401G)	3 cr
Biological Science**	9 cr
Chemistry (includes 1 year organic with laboratory)	8 cr
English Composition or Communications	6 cr
Mathematics (includes algebra and trigonometry)	6 cr
Physics (1 academic year; includes laboratory)	8 cr
Electives in Social Science & Humanities	6 cr
Free Electives (may include advanced biological science courses and/or others)	8 cr
Electives – liberal arts	6 cr

* Animal Science courses can be taken after acceptance; poultry science can be taken via correspondence courses.

** Advanced biology courses, e.g. ., zoology, microbiology, genetics.

A full 6 credit hours of math is required (MA 109 and 123 will fulfill this).

Poultry Science can be taken by correspondence after admission to Tuskegee.

“The curriculum and requirements for admission conform to the standards set forth by the American Veterinary Medical Association. Applicants must present a minimum of three pre-professional years of college credit (100 semester credits or 152 quarter credits) and a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.70 on a 4.00 scale or its equivalent from an accredited US college or university. Grades below C will not be accepted for required courses.

“Applicants who do not include animal science and nutrition courses in their pre professional studies may be admitted at the discretion of the Committee on Veterinary Admissions if they have fulfilled all other requirements. However, these courses must be completed prior to attaining third-year status in the School of Veterinary Medicine.

“Courses required in the professional veterinary medical curriculum cannot be used to satisfy elective admission requirements. It is to the student's advantage to take courses in animal science and animal nutrition before admission to the TUSVM.(emphasis added).

It is recommended that individuals who choose to pursue the pre-professional curriculum at other institutions include one year of physical education in their curriculum. Physical education is a Tuskegee University requirement for graduation. Individuals who do not present credits in physical education on their application may be admitted to the School of Veterinary Medicine but this requirement must be fulfilled prior to attaining third-year status.”
